






ESPIONAGE

Intelligence activity directed towards the acquisition of information through clandestine means.

UNAUTHORIZED TERRORISM

The unlawful use of violence or the threat of violence to instill fear and coerce governments or societies.

DISCLOSURE

A communication or physical transfer of classified information to an unauthorized recipient.

SABOTAGE

Deliberate damage, destruction, or obstruction, particularly for political or military advantage.

TARGETED VIOLENCE

A premeditated act of violence against an individual, group, or location.

SUICIDE

Death caused by self-directed injurious behavior with an intent to die as result of the behavior.

OTHER THREATS

Other loss or degradation of departmental resources or capabilities

- 31yo DOD Contractor, National Geospatial-Intelligence Agency (NGA)
- Political geography analyst
- TOP SECRET/Sensitive Compartmented Information (TS/SCI)
- Air Force Veteran (Enlisted 2009 2014)
- Studied Mandarin at DLI
- Deployed (Afghanistan) as Intelligence Analyst (2012)
- History of childhood abuse and deprivation
- History of pre-service mental health issues
- History of homelessness
- Dropped out of community college and UVA

THE THREAT

- Began communicating with a reporter (2013)
- Devoted himself to "anti-war activism" (2014)
- Accepted "lucrative job offer" with Leidos as a government contractor (2014)
- Printed classified documents, gave them to reporter (2014)
- Plead guilty, sentenced to 45 months in prison (2021)

I too ignores the voice Inside As I continues walking blindly towards the EDGE of AN ARUSS. And when I found myself at the brink, reapy to give in the voice said to me, "You who had been a hunter of men, are no longer. By the grace of God you've been saved. Now go forter and be a fisher of men so that others might know the Truth." 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CASE 1

It is not a secret that I struggle to live with depression and post traumatic stress disorder. Both stem from my childhood experience growing up in a rural mountain community and were compounded by exposure to combat during military service. Depression is a constant. Though stress, particularly stress caused by war, can manifest itself at different times and in different ways. The tell-tale signs of a person afflicted by PTSD and depression can often be outwardly observed and are practically universally recognizable. Hard lines about the face and jaw. Eyes, once bright and wide, now deep set and fearful. And an inexplicably sudden loss of interest in things that used to spark joy. These are the noticeable changes in my demeanor marked by those who knew me before and after military service.

THE INSIDER

- 49-year-old U.S. Coast Guard Lieutenant
- Acquisitions Officer, USCG Headquarters, Washington, DC
- 30+ years military (USMC, Army National Guard, and USCG)
- SECRET Security
 Clearance



Case 2



THE THREAT

- Self identified white nationalist/neo-Nazi/white power skinhead who advocated for "focused violence"
- Used government computer to read mass murder manifestos
- Performed Internet searches and developed lists of potential "leftist" targets, including journalists and politicians
- Conducted attack and targeting research and planning, and operational cover support activities
- Cache of weapons, ammunition, opioids, and steroids
- Tramadol (opiate) addiction





"I don't think I can cause complete destruction on my own, However if I could enlist the unwitting help of another power/country would be best. Who and how to provoke???"


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TARGETED VIOLENCE/ SUICIDE/ OTHER THREATS

THE INSIDER

- 27-year-old Army Specialist, Infantry, Fort Bragg, NC
- Married, with two children under age 5
- Enlisted 2004
- Deployed Iraq 10/2006-11/2007;
 - Afghanistan 9/2010-07/2011
- SECRET Security Clearance



THE THREAT

- Stolen military equipment spurred an investigation.
- Awaiting court martial for larceny (\$1,700 toolkit)
- Preservice offenses:
 - Burglary
 - Battery
 - Marijuana possession
- In-service offenses:
 - Assault (2007)
 - DUI and leaving the scene of an accident (2009).
 - Reckless aggravated battery (2010)
- History of Concussion; Combat Trauma
- Probable PTSD and TBI



"My mind in the past couple of years has folded on itself. I just went to the Dr. and they said I just tested positive for Dementia."

"So one week before I was supposed to get out I was charged with these damn tools. So instead of a (\$)20,000 severance I get to loose (sic) all the benefits and everything I've worked so hard for."
